The following should be studied: Genesis 3:1-4; Ecclesiastes 12:7; 9:5-6, 10; John 11:39-44; Acts 2:23-35; I Corinthians 15:51-54; I Timothy 6:15-16; I Thessalonians 4:13-18; Hebrews 9:27.

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The dead know not any thing

Ecclesiastes 9:5

The Bible and the Christian religion teach that the dead do not know anything, they feel nothing! A living human being consists of body, soul and spirit, and these are tied together. When a person dies, all that is left is a corpse, the spirit having



returned to God, who gave it. Ecclesiastes 12:7. As humans, we were created by God, as it is stated in Genesis 2:7. Man "was made a living soul", as Paul so nicely states this in 1 Corinthians 15:45.



At creation, God **breathed the breath of life** into human being (Genesis 2:7). Then, the human being's blood started pulsating throughout the body – and thus also into the brain. When the brain receives oxygen, a man can start thinking. When the brain no longer gets any oxygen – at death – one is no longer able to

think. Thus, one is no more a spirit and a soul – and his the body remains in the grave until the morning of the resurrection. A man knows and noti-

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To understand our condition in death, you need to know about the creation of mankind, the fall into sin and the plan of redemption. All this is described in the first few chapters of the Bible.

The Arab Job, after whom a book is called in the Bible, was looking forward to the Great Day of the Lord. In Job 19:25-27 he tells of his longing for that day, no matter if he dies!

However, down through the ages there has been a conflict between correct and wrong. There has been a dispute over the nature and destiny of man. Pagan teaching the migration of souls has been pitted against the teaching of Scripture. Le Roy Edwin Froom has sketched this conflict thus:





Froom's book is entitled "The Conditionalist Faith of Our Fathers". There is a link to it at books.ephphatha.dk – there you can see a full size version of his time line. The monotheistic or **condiotionalistic** view on of soul, spirit and body is compared to the incorrect **dualistic** view.

The separation of body and soul stems comes from Greek philosophy and not from the Bible. Paul, however, points in his text to "And so it is written." I Corinthians 15:45.

In Luke 16:23, Jesus uses symbolic language when addressing the Pharisees, in discussing the kingdom of death: "And in hell he lift up his eyes, being in torments, and seeth Abraham afar off." The Pharisees had a distorted view of death, but in this connection Jesus did not wish to speak of man's condition in death. When Jesus



mentioned Lazarus and the rich man, it was to indicate his estimation of them. "Although Lazarus was in so deplorable and mean a condition, he had true faith, true moral worth, which God saw, and which He considered of so great value , while the honored and easeloving man of wealth was thrust out from the presence of God." Testimonies 1:540



Also during the Middle Ages, those in power endeavoured to introduce the idea of reincarnation: "Through the two great errors, the immortality of the soul and Sunday sacredness, Satan will bring the people under his deceptions. While the

former lays the foundation of spiritualism, the latter creates a bond of sympathy with Rome." – *The Great Controversy p 588*

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
